Essential readings and sources for the long seventeenth century in Leeds – from the first map of the town in 1560 to the famous Cossins plan of the 1720s. The period is defined by the emergence of an ambitious class of cloth merchants, culminating in the Charter of 1626, granting the town powers of self-governance for the first time. The Civil Wars of the 1640s brought division among this urban elite but did not impact the town's general trajectory towards its position as the leading market town of the West Riding. Later in the century, figures such as antiquarians Ralph Thoresby and John Hopkinson demonstrate Leeds' development from intellectually provincial outpost to a place in the broader 'Republic of Letters'.
